### **The Assessment Process**

This section of the Evidence Log is for you, the Learner, to monitor your own progress throughout the programme, which will reinforce any comments or observations made by your Instructor or Assessor during debriefs and feedback. At the end of each stage, your Assessor(s) will record evidence of your achievements by completing a Competency Achievement Record and a 1:1 tutorial.

You are required to support this process by recording your weekly reflections which will form part of your evidence of development, in addition to providing valuable information for your Assessor(s) to support your learning.

You will also be given the opportunity to appraise the content of the weekly tutorial and other specific learning outcomes of your programme, including the chance to make written comment, review your performance, undertake a self-assessment, and agree on a support plan with your Assessor(s), if necessary.

Your performance must be consistent across the whole range of learning outcomes, and you will be assessed against the stated assessment criteria. Your performance throughout the programme will be graded as either 'Competent' or 'Deferred'. Your Assessor(s) will record your daily performance on the Competency Achievement Record and state if the required level has been achieved. Should your performance be assessed as 'Deferred', your Assessor(s) will complete a Deferral Support Plan to detail how best to achieve the competencies.

All post-deferral reassessments will be recorded formally on an Assessor Daily Report Form.

The competency grades for the programme can be found in the Overall Competency Framework, which your Assessor(s) will have access to. A copy is also available to Learners by request from your programme Assessor.

### **Knowledge-based Assessments**

Knowledge-based assessment criteria are assessed by three multiple-choice assessments and three work products, as set out in this Evidence Log. All knowledge assessments will be invigilated and taken under examination conditions.

The pass marks for the knowledge-based assessments are listed below. If you fall below this level, you will be deferred against that assessment. Should your assessment be deferred, you will be provided with an opportunity to develop the required learning and be re-assessed at a later date (agreed between you and your Assessor), with the support of a Deferral Support Plan. Your resit assessment will not be the same as the first assessment.

The first MCQ assessment, *Ambulance Driving Principles: Traffics Signs, Signals and Markings* uses a compensatory approach and consists of 60 questions (each worth one mark), randomly selected from The Highway Code, assessing the Learner's knowledge of traffic signs (50 questions), signals (five questions) and road and vehicle markings (five questions).

Please note, all road markings will be accompanied by a direction of travel arrow.

Time Limit: one hour Grading threshold:

Pass: 51 or more correct answers out of 60 (85% or higher) Fail: 50 or fewer correct answers out of 60 (under 85%)

The second MCQ assessment, *Theory Test Before Commencing On-road Training at Speed* uses a compensatory approach and assesses the knowledge areas required to commence on-road training at speed. Learners will be presented with 30 questions (each worth one mark) based on the below:

- Road Traffic Laws, Regulations and the Highway Code (six questions)
- Physiological and Psychological Factors (six questions)
- The System of Car Control (six questions)
- Legal Exemptions (six questions)
- Using In-car Technology Legal and Safety Requirements (six questions)

Please note, unless otherwise specified in the question, responses should be in line with procedures for routine ambulance vehicle driving.

Time limit: 45 minutes Grading threshold:

Pass: 24 or more correct answers out of 30 (80% or higher) Fail: 23 or fewer correct answers out of 30 (under 80%)

The third MCQ assessment, *Ambulance Driving Principles: Legislation, Roadcraft and The Highway Code* uses a compensatory approach and will present the Learner with 60 questions (each worth one mark) covering all ACs (excluding 1.4, 2.1, 3.5, 3.6, 3.7, 3.8 and 10.3) in this Component.

Please note, several of the questions are situationally based and may, therefore, include an individual's name, such as Jane or Mohammed, to set the scene or contextualise the scenario.

Unless otherwise specified in the question, responses should be in line with procedures for routine ambulance vehicle driving.

Time limit: 1 hour 30 minutes

**Grading threshold:** 

Pass: 45 or more correct answers out of 60 (75% or higher) Fail: 44 or fewer correct answers out of 60 (under 75%)

**Work Products** - The three knowledge-based work products are included in the *Certificate in Emergency Response Ambulance Driving at SCQF Level 6 Learner Work Product Document* and cover incident management, the capabilities of ambulance vehicles within your organisation, and human factors.

### **Practically Assessed Components**

All the assessment criteria in Component 2 are assessed through practical observations using this Evidence Log, which sets out the requirements to be met in order to achieve the required standard.

The following three observations will count towards the final assessment decision of your qualification:

- Direct Observation
- Pre-Emergency Response Driving Assessment
- Final Independent Driving Assessment

**Direct Observation** - You will be observed against a number of competencies that will support specific assessment criteria within the practical Component. To be successful, you must be deemed 'Competent' against all the competencies being assessed.

The structure of these observations allows your Assessor to record you as either 'Competent' or 'Deferred' and provides the opportunity to give you feedback on your performance. If a deferral decision is made, you will be observed a second time. Further observations will be undertaken at the Centre's discretion.

**Pre-Emergency Response Driving Assessment** - Your driving standard will be observed by your Assessor and formally recorded in this Evidence Log. You must successfully demonstrate all the listed competencies to the required standard in order to progress on to emergency response ambulance driving. The standard required can be found on the Overall Competency Framework, which will be made available to you upon request.

This assessment will take place prior to moving on to the emergency response ambulance driving section of your programme. It lasts for approximately 40 minutes (a minimum of 30 minutes), takes place over mixed roads and allows your Assessor to confirm whether you are ready to progress, or if further development is required.

**Final Independent Driving Assessment** - This final driving assessment lasts for one hour and observes both your routine and emergency response ambulance driving.

Due to the inherited risks, the Independent Assessor (Final Examiner) may run the emergency response assessment until such time an assessment decision can be reached. In areas where the national speed limit is in force, and where road and traffic conditions allow, the Independent Assessor will expect you to make progress, exceeding the posted speed limits whilst adhering to your organisation's policies, providing it is safe to do so.

You must decide when it is safe to activate and deactivate the emergency warning equipment, if it is safe to make progress, and if the claiming of legal exemptions is required/appropriate. However, safety must remain paramount at all times.

Be prepared to turn the audible and visual warning devices off when appropriate. Remember your duty of care to other road users.

During your Final Independent Driving Assessment, your driving standard will be observed throughout, mainly using direct observation and direct assessment. However, the Independent Assessor (Final Examiner) may ask a range of questions to confirm your knowledge and understanding, which may not be practically tested due to circumstances beyond control.

You must demonstrate that your driving standard is safe, systematic, smooth and progressive. Response driving must be appropriate and lawful and meet the specified grading criteria outlined by the Overall Competency Framework. A copy of this is available upon request.

You will not achieve the required standard if you do not demonstrate the required competencies, commit a road traffic offence, or place the vehicle, other road users or the public in actual or potential danger.

The Final Independent Driving Assessment cannot be taken until the Learner has undertaken a minimum of 24 hours of driving and has been assessed as 'Competent' for both Component 1 and all other Component 2 assessments. This assessment **must** be conducted by an Independent Assessor (Final Examiner), in line with the FutureQuals Assessment Principles for Emergency Response Ambulance Driving Qualifications.
